AACC Weekend Ride Schedule—June

June Ride Schedule

Saturday, June 4, 2005—Sierra Century at Plymouth, CA This is a really great century ride in the Sierra Foothills, and is usually well attended by AACC riders. Lots of hilly terrain including the infamous Slug Gulch. The Sacramento Wheelmen will present you with a special Slug Gulch pin if you tackle this piece of topography. There is always a good feed afterwards. If anyone has designs on doing the Death Ride, this event is good training. See you there!

Sunday, June 5, 2005 — Easy tour of Carson City This is an easy ride on gentle terrain meant for beginning riders. We'll probably get in about 25 miles, depending on capability of the riders. We'll work on riding skills and some on-road flat tire fixing technique. If you rode hard the day before at the Sierra Century, this will be a good recovery ride, and you could help some new riders enjoy the sport. Meet in the parking lot at the Carson City Community Center on Hwy 50 (East William Street) at 09:00.

Sunday, June 12, 2005 — Markleeville to Lake Alpine and Back An old fave returns. Make no mistake, this is a hard ride, featuring some extended climbing well into the teens percent grade w/some 20%+ pitches. This is one of the classic road rides in the Sierras. The scenery is fantastic, and there will be a sense of accomplishment after conquering those world class climbs. It's about 60 miles, but the distance has nothing on the climbing. Bring some \$ to buy food at Lake Alpine. Meet at the Alpine County building parking lot in Markleeville at 09:00.

Sunday June 19, 2005 — Packsaddle Pass and Mormon Emigrant Trail Loop This is a scenic mountain loop on some little known roads with, unfortunately, a bit of riding on a busy highway. To avoid traffic, we'll meet at the foot of old Meyers Grade where it intersects South Upper Truckee Road and leave at 08:00 am. We head up and over Echo Summit and descend past Strawberry where we leave Hwy 50 for the safety of a lightly traveled USFS paved road. This will take us over Packsaddle Pass to the Silver Fork Road that comes from Kyburz. We'll then climb up to meet the Mormon Emigrant Trail, then Hwy 88 back to Silver Lake, Kirkwood, Carson Pass, and Hope Valley. We'll take old Luther Pass and Hwy 89 back to the start. Lots of climbing and seventy some miles. Bring some \$ to buy food along the way.

Sunday, June 26, 2005—Get that mountain bike down from the rafters, and head for the hills! It's an even numbered day, so we can ride the **Rim Trail**. We ride from the Ponderosa Ranch at Incline, up the old Mount Rose Road to the Tahoe Meadows, then south on to the Rim Trail and the Flume Trail, to Marlette Lake, and return via the Rim Trail and Tunnel Creek. Meet near the Ponderosa Ranch along Hwy 28 at 09:00. Riding time is about 6 hours with lots of climbing and technical terrain. Bring your camera and plenty of food and water.

12 of 14 members of NBAB met and discussed many items including applying for a grant from the Department of Public Safety to purchase bicycle helmets for distribution at bicycle events throughout the state. Like AACC the NBAB also reviewed and updated its Goals and Objectives, but only after a couple of years. We also discuss the budget and status of accounts.

Bicycle Nevada jerseys are still selling well and were recently sold at the Chico Wildflower Century and other bicycling events. The NBAB is also pursuing a "**Bicycle Nevada –** Share the Road" vanity plate in Nevada. The design is taken from the Bicycle Nevada jersey. We need to get a minimum number of signatures to get the bicycle plate a reality. Look for sign-up sheets at you local bike shop and the Bicycle Nevada website www.bicyclenevada.com. Please sign it, and encourage others to sign it, too!

NBAB has helped organize a Safety Charette for SR159 in Las Vegas area. Hopefully getting all the minds together will bring some solutions to a dangerous bicycle route.

Nevada Bicycle staff showed the new State Bicycle Event Map for 2005. All events associated some way (like the Death Ride and AACC) with Nevada were included.

Death Valley Century

The Death Valley Century was held on Saturday March 5, 2005 in Furnace Creek, CA, within Death Valley NP. This annual Century and Double Century event has now been taken over by Adventure Corps, and they did well on organizing the event. The Death Valley rides are limited to 300 due to the NPS. The spring (first Saturday in March) and fall (last Saturday in October) fill up fast.

The route this year was the southern route, a detour from normal, as Laura Bush was at Scotty's Castle. The route is Furnace Creek-Badwater-Ashford Mills (rollers up) and then up Jubilee Pass and turnaround and head back. Pavement is good to start but very bumpy patchy pavement up Ashford Mills and beyond. Support and rest stop food OK. No end-of-ride meal. Cost of \$50 seems high, but this is a remote site ride (like Death Ride) and things cost more. T-shirt, this year only, fair.

Best part of the ride is the scenery! The view of in-your-face geology, recent hydrological events and flowers was spectacular! Ride is worth doing – at least once!

Party Pardee Metric Century

This is a great warm-up metric ride for the start of the season. Ride was on Saturday April 2nd and put on by Sacramento Bike Hikers. Ride starts and stop in Ione, CA, a quaint foothill town. This year's theme was "Octoberfest." Ride is well organized, as usual. T-Shirt was good, support and route food good, and good

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Roadie Ride Previews

Riders & Previewers: John Axtel, Bart Narter, Jennie Hamiter

June 4, Eastern Sierra Double put on by Planet Ultra, no frills, starts and ends in Bishop, CA, a good double relatively nearby, adequate support. Ride starts at the Outdoorsmen Motel. My room was supposed to be non-smoking but was not , windows did not open, others have had the same problemlots of better motels in Bishop, all a short ride to the Outdoorsmen, –John

June 4, Sierra Century–Well attended by AACC'ers, only a couple hours away, really nice ride. Starts in Plymouth and then east into the mountains. Slug Gulch is the famous steep climb, named perhaps for how you feel when you're riding a bike up it! The Gulch feels like the hottest part of the ride, but if you can survive that, the rest of the ride is on nice roads; it's well worth the pain of that one harsh climb. A good Death Ride training ride: the 100 mile version: 7,500 ft of climbing; the 200K: 10,000 ft. –Jennie

June 5, Sequoia Century–Starts at the VA Hospital, Palo Alto and climbs the infamous Redwood Gulch to Highway 9 and to Skyline. Heads south on Skyline towards Santa Cruz and Summit Road. There's a great downhill on Old Soquel San Jose Road. Then get ready for a serious uphill battle on East Zayante! You eventually head north on the rolling hills of Skyline with bay and ocean views and then down Page Mill Road to the finish. –Bart

June 25, Terrible Two-An excellent double that starts and ends in Santa Rosa, excellent route and support. This year is their 30th anniversary, so they are bringing back the original course, 211 fun-filled miles with 16,000 feet of elevation gain. If it is hot, it is tough. If it is cool, it's not bad. Part of the route follows the coast between Fort Ross and a little north of Salt Point. You get to ride through some redwoods and some very rough sections with pot holes, but definitely worth doing. –John

June 25, Climb to Kaiser, it is only 157 miles but is as tough as most doubles, much tougher than the Death Ride, good course and support, though the traffic is a little heavy on several sections. Starts near Fresno and climbs up into the Sierras, worth doing at least once. –John

Giro de Peninsula Century June 25 –This century benefits children and adults with developmental disabilities. The century involves a fair amount of climbing up Old La Honda and over to the coast with a climb back up Tunitas Creek to Skyline. There are several mileage options and the rest stops are very frequent and well stocked with goodies. –Bart
